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5th Sunday of Easter

Acts 11.1-18 Psalm 148 Revelation 21.1-6 John 13.31-35

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Sometimes we are tempted to think that in the early church it was all sweetness and light with everything going on in harmony. This is a bit of a mistake - our gospels tell us that the twelve disciples chosen by Jesus could be an argumentative bunch and sometimes quite dim in their lack of understanding of what Jesus was about.

Our reading from Acts opens with a bit of a row with Peter being challenged in what he is doing: eating with those who had become believers in Jesus but who were not Jewish. This argument about whether believers who were Gentiles (persons who were not Jewish) could eat with Jewish believers nearly scuppered the church before it had hardly got going.

Those with a Jewish background would have taken the Jewish food customs about what you could or could not eat very seriously and as for eating with Gentiles, that was quite beyond the pale. That's why Peter goes into such detail in his explanation concerning his vision, which led him to understand why it was possible for Jews and Gentiles to be members of the church and eat together on an equal footing. In Christ, the Jewish food laws no longer applied. This account of his vision, of the sheet coming from heaven was of such importance in addressing who may eat with whom that it is referred to several times in Acts.

It also is the reason why being a Christian does not bind us to follow any compulsory rules concerning what we eat - but many will choose to be vegetarian or vegan for ethical or environmental reasons or out of concern for God's creation.

The idea of a new creation having its origins in the risen Christ is strongly conveyed in our reading from Revelation, in which he declares himself to be the Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end. Alpha and Omega are the first and last letters in the Greek alphabet. Peter realises that all are one in

Christ when the Gentile people in the household he is visiting receive the Holy Spirit just as he and his fellow Jewish apostles had done at Pentecost.

Peter now knows that in Christ there is no distinction between Jew and Gentile believers. There is a new creation in the action of the Holy Spirit so that all believers in Christ are equal in God's sight. This includes us. When we are baptised, we too become part of the earthly and heavenly community of believers.

Then in our gospel reading we see that Judas has left the meal which continues in his absence. He's had his feet washed and then been given a piece of bread in friendship by Jesus - but he still goes out to organise the betrayal and arrest of his Lord. Once he's gone, Jesus tells the disciples to love one another. Perhaps this does not sound too difficult - but then Jesus tells them to love one another as he has loved them.

This is a new commandment, a positive instruction and one which we may struggle with when we contemplate the self-giving love of Jesus for his disciples. This self-giving love is still there for us but so often we forget it. For some of us, giving or receiving love is hard, especially if we feel that we have been used or betrayed by someone, yet we believe that Jesus still loves Judas, even as he exits the room.

Each one of us has to learn to love in the way Jesus has commanded us and this may take time and be painful. It reminds us of the commandment of Jesus in Matthew 5.44-45 to love our enemies and to pray for those who have wronged or hurt us. This new commandment to love is part of the new creation of Christ under the guidance of the Holy Spirit who makes all things new.

Then Jesus tells us that this love of his disciples for one another is what will enable others to know that they are his disciples. We are today's disciples and our manner of living in our church community (and out of it) will either attract or repel others. May we all be faithful in trying to live out this awesome new commandment of our dear Lord.

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!




