That Old Familiar Story Christmas Day (Luke 2.1-20)

In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Amen

Each year we make the journey to Bethlehem and revisit the Christmas story. Each year therefore, we find ourselves a little older (possibly wiser) and a little or a lot different, depending on what the year contained for us and the world around us. This means each time we peek into the crib to see the Christ-child, it is likely a different element of the very familiar story will resonate with us in comparison to other years. I wonder what leaps out at you on this time round?

Christmas morning itself is usually quiet, whether you are in town or country. There is that sense that whether people are believers or not, somehow God's hush of silence has descended to most places. I'm sure in reality that some places will be noisier than others but let's remain in the realm of fancifully poetic for a moment: that lull of silence offers the possibility of hearing something else, something important, something God may wish us to hear. We may have to wait a little though.

A couple of other people waiting include Mary and Joseph and they are not in the most comfortable of surroundings – rather a stable complete with animals, dirt, and straw; they wait alongside their precious newborn, who is wrapped in cloths and to be found sleeping or babbling in a manger.

Mary and Joseph have waited for the birth of this child since that moment when the angelic visitor Gabriel came to Mary to say that she would bear a son, Jesus. They have waited since Mary's resounding 'Yes'. Now, in Bethlehem, they continue to wait, wondering what will happen next? Who can blame them? After the flurry of divine activity at the beginning of all this, God's silence stretches out. Or so it seems ...

Meanwhile, above the fields in that region, the silence of the dark night is about to be pierced by fireworks as God's angelic messenger appears to shepherds doing the night watch, terrifying them in the process.

The shepherds are not quite ordinary folk: to a certain extent they would be considered outsiders for living and working with the animals and not attending worship. If you like, they would be considered 'people-least-likely-to' - and in that sense they will make good company for the teenage girl and her carpenter back at the stable. God seems to delight in picking 'those-least-likely-to'; it is the stuff of Mary's song, the Magnificat.

Returning to the fields, our angel gives to the shepherds God's joyful message of good news for all the people: that in the city of David a Saviour is born, the Messiah, the

Lord. The angel speaks of the sign: that the child is wrapped in cloth and will be found lying in a manger. This is an incredible message for the shepherds to hear but it goes further; for this angel is joined by a multitude of angels and they sing a hymn of praise to God.

That night the shepherds cast aside their usual duties (and in a way they foreshadow the fishermen-disciples who drop their nets and go). The shepherds risk leaving their sheep and now they take on the mantle of God's messengers, hurrying on into the silent darkness of the town, looking for the child.

As soon as they find Mary and Joseph, the shepherds pass on the message from the angel of the Lord; it is a message of confirmation and of comfort, to be pondered and treasured especially if (or rather as we know when) things become difficult. The delivering of the message, and the content too, reveals that God has not forgotten or abandoned Mary and Joseph. Silence does not mean that God is not acting; when ready, God's message will come through - and likely in unexpected ways from unexpected people!

We see this in the way the shepherds behave in response to their angelic chums as they return to their fields (hopefully to find that on this occasion the wolf shall live with the lamb): they continue to proclaim the good news of the Saviour's birth, praising God for what they have seen and heard - and this to everyone they meet!

For me, Mary and Joseph's experience speaks loudly of encouragement in times of waiting: wait with hopeful expectation, for God will be doing something in the silence. There is something here too about learning to live with uncertainty in anxious times and asking for God's peace and patience when it gets a bit frustrating or overwhelming.

Yet the shepherds' experience also shows us that God's message of good news via the angels brings about transformation and action. What does it mean to hear such a message? And will we welcome the messenger? How are we called to respond and proclaim the good news? Well, it will be different in word or deed for each of us depending on our giftings and contexts.

What is undoubtedly true is that however our response to the angelic words manifests, there will be Christmas joy and peace. This is the kind of deep inner joy and peace which lasts long after the decorations are tidied away and the last of the chocolates are snaffled up, lovely as these things certainly are. It is the joy and peace arising from living life in response to the truth to be found when we peek afresh into the crib and gaze on the Christ-child.

Wait and listen and respond.

Song of the Shepherd (Luke 2)

I wonder who taught you to sing?

Was it your Mum? Or maybe your Dad?

Perhaps it was your teacher, you know the rabbi from the down the road ...

Not for me – I was never very bright.

I kept forgetting all the songs we were supposed to remember; that did not go down very well.

Oh, but I did remember one!

The Lord is my shepherd.

I always liked that one and I have to say it greatly influenced what I decided to do with my life.

You see, I never really fitted in and family life was not so good ... so the perfect job for me was to look after sheep.

I liked it ... up on the hills, away from it all.

Caring for these simple woolly creatures: I talked to them, and they trusted me. It might sound silly, but I wanted to be like the shepherd in the song, you know, making sure the sheep were comfortable with green pastures and still waters.

Yet it could be a bit tiring guarding the sheep night and day, so you will be pleased to hear that I was not on my own: there were other shepherds, young and old. We were a bit of a motley crew.

We were quite rough and ready, very grubby in appearance, and we did smell like sheep – all the time.

We had no friends or family other than each other.

People didn't want to come near us, and we didn't go near them.

In fact, we were called 'unclean'. That was upsetting.

Maybe I shouldn't dwell on that.

Let's see! The nights were the hardest part of the job: long and exhausting, always needing to be alert in case a big bad wolf or worse came prowling. If I am honest, it was a little scary too.

To keep awake we would light a fire and tell stories.

We even attempted to sing, though it didn't amount to much.

Our voices were not tuneful, and left a lot to be desired.

One night though, everything changed.

We were grazing the sheep high on the hills above Bethlehem.

It was pitch black, and so, so, cold.

The sheep were tense, which made us tense.

The air was heavy, and it felt like we were on the brink of something.

In fact, we were!

An angel appeared, and we were terrified.

We could barely look at him, for he shone white and yellow light, so bright that our eyes hurt.

This was the glory of the Lord.

When the angel spoke and reassured us, we calmed down - well sort of.

We heard a most beautiful message, about the birth of our Saviour, the Messiah, the Lord.

The Lord who is my Shepherd!

He is here in Bethlehem!

The angel gave us a sign: to look for a tiny child, wrapped in clothes and lying in a manger.

Then to our astonishment the whole sky filled with angels, a heavenly host.

They opened their mouths and music poured out, filling our ears with their song of praise:

'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours'.

After this explosion of light and sound, we were once more alone ... but we were changed.

We found we had the angels' music within us, and we wanted to share their message.

To sing the heavenly song we had to find the child, so we left the sheep and hurried:

Half-running, half-tumbling down the hillside.

After much searching we found a ramshackle hut.

Amidst the animals and the dirt, and the straw, was a young woman and man, weary but happy,

watching over a baby.

The scene was like the angels had said, and we told the family of the amazing thing we had witnessed.

My heart leapt for joy, because this child seemed ordinary, just like us, and yet there was something of heaven about him.

It seemed so natural to sing and praise God.

Afterwards we left to return to the sheep, telling anybody and everybody on the way all that had happened.

We did not, could not, stop singing songs of praise,

for the angel had put the song of heaven onto our lips.

And all these years later, I'm still singing.
