Palm Sunday

Liturgy of the Palms: Mark I 1.1-11 or John 12-12-26 Liturgy of the Passion: Isaiah 50.4-9a Philippians 2.5-11 Mark 14 & 15

It is Palm Sunday and we remember Jesus's entry into Jerusalem, the applause and rejoicing of the crowds as they wave their palm branches and their shouts of: "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord, the king of Israel."

And, of course, Jesus had come to announce the Kingdom. The Kingdom of God - its proclamation, its inauguration, its exposition - was what Jesus was all about. With the triumphal entry it seems that this Kingdom will now be established. Christ's victory seems near.

Christ's victory seems near ... and then the ensuing events are a shattering reversal. But Jesus's very actions carry the implication of that reversal. He fulfils the prophecy of Zechariah 9.9: "Lo, your King comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

Jesus has quite deliberately chosen to identify himself with this passage. He is not an assertive ruler, riding on a charger as a demonstration of power, but a humble one, on the foal of a donkey.

All the same, nothing could be more striking than this huge lurch - as the Holy Week events unfold - from triumph to disaster.

And yet, in those events, that reversal, that disaster - in which Jesus is betrayed, denied and abandoned in every conceivable way, and comes to be judicially murdered in a grotesque parody of justice - we have come to see some sort of answer to all the questions we have about what it means to be human.

As Jesus goes to his cruel execution and his followers' hopes are destroyed, we find in his defeat a victory.

So it is that the passion narrative is a dominating part of all four gospels, a sign of the Church's awareness from the earliest times that these events are *crucial* (from the Latin *crux/crucifix*: cross). The cross is for us, quite literally, crucial, the crux of the matter. The message is built into our very language.

The gospel accounts are similar, but they have marked differences, too. There is authentic note here of eyewitness accounts. It is important that this is not just the greatest of stories, but that it is real, rooted in the human experience that we know.

These events can only be crucial if Jesus is *both* fully human and fully divine. This is a mystery the Church has spent 2,000 years trying to comprehend.

In the end it is a mystery, and our efforts - essential though they are - to get our heads around it are bound to fail. They even need to fail: God is not to be contained within the vessels of our understanding.

This most holy of weeks can help us instead to enter into the passion with our emotions, with our experience, reaching towards understanding with our heart and guts, where our heads just get mental wheelspin and our brains fuse.

Yes, this is a cosmic drama. Yes, these are divine actions. And yes, too, these ae human events constrained, like us, by time and place.

Here is the shocking rejection and death of God. And here, too, is the victory which saves us - in the human experience of the man Jesus, whose calling leads him somehow to take the pain of suffering creation upon himself. This action can be truly divine for us only if it is fully human, fully vulnerable.

This is what we commemorate and celebrate in the Eucharist, the sacrament of glorified humility, blood sacrifice in benign elements.

The victory of the cross lies in the fact that the man Jesus - whom we gaze on in horrified fascination, from whatever distance we can cope with, as he follows his call to take the way of the cross - perfectly shows us this divine humility.

This is a week to enter into these events imaginatively, to push ourselves closer to Jesus in his humility, in has passive acceptance of the betrayals and brutality, so as to come nearer to the victory of salvation he brings us.

As we seek to experience Holy Week deeply, we shall open ourselves to experience Easter deeply, too. This is a gift waiting to be found in all the acts of worship offered to us and for us as the coming days unfold: a deeper sense of the love and forgiveness of God.




HIGH SHERIFF RECOGNISES OUTSTANDING SERVICE TO COMMUNITY IN ANNUAL AWARDS CEREMONY
