All Saints' Day

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All Saints' Day (transferred from 1st November)

Guardian angels are a comfort to many, but a longer-established idea of a heavenly being with personal connection to one is the patron saint. So our churches, cathedrals, schools and other institutions are typically dedicated to one or more recognised saints. A church will keep a date for a patronal festival, on the calendar day of that saint. Some have been more popular than others: a quarter of this country's old churches have the Blessed Virgin Mary as patron, while in this region SS Peter and Paul often figure.

'What's a saint?' This question comes in John Henry Newman's great poem, 'The Dream of Gerontius'. The question is rudely answered by a chorus of demons: 'A bundle of bones, which fools adore......'

In the New Testament 'saints' are simply all members of the (sanctified) believing community, or followers of 'The Way'. Some Christians still like to keep to this view, not needing the idea of canonisation. But the Roman Church, keeping the requirement of crediting two miracles to a departed worthy person, is happily still adding to the number of official saints.

The saints are not to be thought of as disappearing into special privilege, but as an inspiration and helpful example to all ordinary strugglers. They show that holiness is not out of reach to anyone. Further, they bring that warming comfort of linking earth with heaven. They make intercession for us, but that does not mean we may neglect our own prayers.

'Saintly' is a word widely understood, implying tolerance and endurance without any resentful reaction. It is not necessarily applied to believers, but is seen to show a different outlook from the normal human 'tit for tat', or for that matter the law of talion prescribed in the Jewish Law. Calling someone a 'saint' suggests one who will never complain, but always go the second mile.

This year the Gospel reading is not the Matthaean 'Sermon on the Mount' (called the Beatitudes), but the Lukan version known as 'the Sermon on the

Plain'. Luke only gives four, not nine, beatitudes (or blessings) and also provides antithetical 'Woes', in a promised reversal of present conditions. Those now poor, marginalised and reviled will be restored, whereas those now comfortable will meet a time of suffering.

We're told Jesus had just chosen the Twelve on the mountain, but had come down to the crowds below. These injunctions are for all who 'listen', then and now. As an anticipation of the Kingdom, attitudes, words and actions must show heavenly values, as opposed to those of the world. You must love your enemies, give kindness for hatred, turn the other cheek, and be generous to all. And there is the golden rule, 'Do to others as you would have them do to you'.

However, there is usually something more varied in stories of the saints in the calendar. Many have taken a lonely, unpopular stand against accepted issues of their day, like the prophets of old. They may have shown a burning wrath against corruption or hypocrisy. Following Our Lord can mean showing a similar display of anger to that in his cleansing of the Temple from venal trading, or his condemnation of the complacent and self-righteous. Taking such a stand has often led to martyrdom and subsequent official sainthood, from a perceived holiness in disregard of earthly comfort.

An early Church Father said that the blood of the martyrs was the seed of the Church. The practice soon arose of celebrating the Eucharist on a martyr's tomb. As we know, shrines have become places of pilgrimage. Persecution fires dedication and devotion, with honour naturally given to those who placed love of God and heavenly values above safety on earth. Not all were put to death; some sustained a 'white martyrdom' of suffering, while others simply shone as beacons of holiness.

Celebrating this feast began in the 4th Century, on the Sunday following Pentecost, as martyrdom was seen as a baptism of fire, conferring near-apostolic status. From the 8th Century however, following a chapel's dedication in St. Peter's, November 1st became All Saints' Day. The Church has always marked the Eve of a major holy day, and 'Hallows' is another word for holy ones, hence 'Hallowe'en'.

The wonderful collect reminds us we are part of the elect 'knit together' in the mystical Body of Christ, and so humbly seek, following the saints, to be brought at last in the love of God to heavenly joys:

Almighty God,

you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord: grant us grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living that we may come to those inexpressible joys that you have prepared for those who truly love you: through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Again from Gerontius, the song of the angels and holy ones in heaven:

Praise to the Holiest in the height And in the depth be praise: In all His words most wonderful, Most sure in all His ways.





Read the relevant material before each session, both the stories and the accompanying notes.


