3rd Sunday of Advent

Isaiah 61.1-4,8-end Psalm 126 or Magnificat I Thessalonians 5.16-24 John 1.6-8,19-28

Today's readings give us much to think about. In this third Sunday of Advent we focus on John the Baptist. John who came as a witness, seeing himself simply as a Voice. A Voice crying out in the wilderness, bearing testimony to the light.

John, who was great indeed, for even Jesus said in Matthew II:II, 'among those born of women, no-one is greater than John the Baptist'. So John was greater then Abraham, Moses, Elijah...he was indeed great.

But John was there purely to be a Voice, bearing witness to someone else. For as it says in John 1:8, he came to testify to the light.

I wonder that if John had been born today in our culture of celebrity and football hero worship, would he have had a cult following and been a great TV personality? He could have had a recording contract and a house in the country and been on his way to making his first million.

But he didn't see himself as the hero of the hour ... instead he pointed away from himself to the 'one who is coming after me' ... to Jesus who is the light of the world.

Are we ready to be like that? Are we willing to give up our desire for self-expression ... to see ourselves as wholly there for others? I am reminded of both Mother Theresa and Brother Roger of Taizé here ... two people who gave up any personal desires they may have had of self-fulfilment, to work wholly for God.

Our Old Testament reading is the passage that Jesus applies to himself in his sermon in Nazareth, which we read about in Luke, chapter 4. It expresses the sense of being anointed and commissioned to act and speak, not for ourselves but for God. 'The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me', we hear Jesus saying, using the words of Isaiah, 'because the Lord has anointed me...' Then we hear so many wonderful prophecies: the poor will receive good news, broken hearts will be healed, there will be liberation for prisoners and justice will reign ... all to be fulfilled in the life of Jesus the Messiah.

But let's look at what Paul is saying in our second reading for a moment. There is so much packed here into a very small space.

We are to rejoice. Our celebration is rooted in what Jesus Christ has done for us. We are to pray ceaselessly ... we may think this is easily done, as we attempt to pray for less than one hour in every 24. Paul was busy too, but he could still speak of anticipating, here and now, the life of heaven. We are to be grateful in all circumstances ... gratitude is at the heart of the genuine humanity modelled for us by Jesus Christ ... living in the present, in the light of God's promised future. We can see this in the lives of both Mother Theresa and Brother Roger too.

But it also reminds me of Terry Anderson, a journalist, who wrote 'Den of Lions' a few years back. He was caught up in the troubles in Lebanon and lived in chains for 7 years.

Half way through his imprisonment he wrote:

"I rarely ask God for freedom any more. He knows how much I want to go home. I've told him so often, he'd better know by now. I pray for patience, acceptance, strength. I give thanks for what I have. I'm not a saint or anything. But I'm sane. I think I am. I still rage. Sometimes I want to scream in frustration, but less often now. I am deeply unhappy and alone, but I know I can live. I'm just trying to be in touch with God. Not praying for freedom, but just trying to be in touch with God."

That speaks to me so much of Paul's words in our reading today: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. Do not quench the Spirit...may the God of peace himself sanctify you entirely." [I Thess. 5]

Terry Anderson lived those words. Although he was unable to rejoice always, he was able - really able - to remain faithful in prayer. As we reach the mid-point of Advent today, perhaps we all need to get more in touch with our own life of personal faith and prayer?

We often pray, 'Come Lord Jesus', asking Jesus to come into the situation we are in. Asking Jesus to come to us as we really are, to help us to embrace our lives, whatever may be happening this very day. Helping us, in the midst of the reality of our lives, to be filled with praise and thanksgiving. Helping us to worship in Spirit and in truth.

In this kind of prayer, we are not just asking for God to change things around us. We are being open to the possibility of change within us ... change in how we see things, how we experience things, how we evaluate things in the light of faith and hope.

We live out our lives of faith and prayer individually, person by person. You and I will live out our lives of faith and prayer, just as for centuries people like Isaiah, Paul and John the Baptist, once lived ... all of whom are featured in our readings today. If faith and prayer can sustain Isaiah, Paul and other great Bible figures ... as well as in more recent years ... Mother Theresa, Brother Roger and Terry Anderson ... who's to say that you and I, too, will not be sustained in our own lives of faith, hope and prayer?

And a concluding prayer for this Advent season:

Come to us Lord Jesus, here and now.

Be our Lord, our guide and our teacher here in this place.

- O come Emmanuel: be God with us, God in our world.
- O come thou Wisdom from on high: show us the path of knowledge.
- O come thou Dayspring from on high:

cheer us by thy drawing nigh, alongside each one of us.

O come, Desire of Nations:

make us instruments of peace and reconciliation.

Maranatha: come Lord Jesus, come!

Amen.


