9th Sunday after Trinity

Jeremiah 23.23-29 Psalm 82 Hebrews 11.29-12.2 Luke 12.49-56

There seem to have been a lot of scams doing the rounds lately. Some of these include schemes saying that if you invest in a certain account paying an extraordinarily high rate of interest, you will make a lot of money. As we know deep down, if something sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

Such scams also remind us that we should be cautious of those who tell us things that we want to hear — it may lead us into a false sense of security. That's what is going on in our first reading from Jeremiah. He tells the people that they are being misled by false prophets who are telling the people agreeable things that they like. Such false prophets ae saying that all is well and that everything will all right. They are not being truthful — and the people don't want to hear the truth, they would rather be deceived.

The truth is spoken by Jeremiah. He says that God is not pleased with the behaviour of his people. They have taken to worshipping Baal rather than their own true God, the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

At the moment we hear all kinds of messages, especially online. It is often very difficult to discern what is true and what is not. Who are the true prophets and who are the false ones in our own day? Who is being truthful and who is just feeding us on things that they think we want to hear?

In the reading from Jeremiah, God asks what has straw in common with wheat, the answer being that wheat is nutritious and straw is not. So we might ask today's prophets what is likely to build up and nourish our communities and what will destroy them and lead to ill feeling and discord?

We note how Jesus says in our gospel reading that we can interpret the signs of the weather and know whether or not it is going to rain or be very hot. In the same way we need to learn to interpret the signs of our times to discern who are the good prophets of our own day. That's why now more than ever we need to pray for our leaders that they may do what is right and good for our country and our world at this time.

Then in our Gospel reading we find Jesus turning our ideas of so-called Christian family life completely upside down. He says that because of him, households will be divided with family members against one another. It sounds a bit like a domestic civil war.

Yet we know that this does happen because sometimes people who become Christians and take following Jesus seriously find that their nearest and dearest just don't get it - and there is pain and distress on all sides. Perhaps some of us have had similar personal experiences in our own families.

The first Christians certainly knew about this conflict between family members. When Luke's gospel was being put together, many Christians were disowned by their families for following Jesus. In some places in the world, this still happens.

All this reminds us that those who try to speak the truth are often most unwelcome, and their message is rejected by those who don't want to hear it. Jeremiah found this out. The words which he spoke came from God and these words were not what the people wanted to hear. Jeremiah was treated very badly indeed because of what he said.

Some Christians have also been treated very badly and many have given their lives rather than abandon their faith in Jesus. This still happens in parts of the world where in the eyes of the authorities being a Christian is a dangerous, subversive thing to be.

This reading from Hebrews reminds us that being true to our faith is not an easy option. It can be dangerous or even life threatening to suffer in the cause of righteousness and of being faithful to Christ.

These readings surely make us ask ourselves, how far are we prepared to go to follow Christ, even if it causes us distress or pain? How far are we prepared to go in speaking the truth and perhaps acting as a prophet in our own place, within our families and wider community? It may be that this is part of what we are called to do as we run the race of our Christian life - but we know that Jesus has gone that way before us and so we look to him to give us strength to do what is truthful and right.






