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2nd Sunday of Epiphany

I Samuel 3.1-10[11-20] Psalm 139.1-5,12-18 Revelation 5.1-10 John 1.43-end

'Follow me.' Jesus says this a number of times in our gospels – and he still calls us today to be his followers.

Our readings are about the call of God - the call of God that persists and does not go away. In our reading from I Samuel we discover how God called Samuel, who was a young lad learning how to serve God in the temple by being with Eli, the priest in charge there. Samuel is a bit like an apprentice or perhaps an altar server. However, we are told it was not common for people to hear the voice of God or to have visions - so when God does call Samuel he draws the obvious conclusion and thinks that it is Eli calling to him.

It takes a while for the penny to drop with Eli that it is in fact God calling Samuel. Then when he does realize what is going on, he gives Samuel advice on what he should do. We may imagine the scene - it's probably very early in the morning before dawn. The temple lamp is still alight. And we are told that the Lord comes very quietly and stands there by Samuel who is lying down in the temple. Again he calls, 'Samuel, Samuel.' Samuel responds, and says 'speak Lord for your servant is listening.'

This is a prayer we can all take to heart, 'Speak Lord, for your servant is listening'. It is very easy to find that our prayer becomes a kind of wish list of things that we want God to do for us or for other people. Of course, it is quite right and proper that we should pray for others and for ourselves. But we should also try to allow God to get a word in to us, and to do this we need to be quiet and open the ears of our hearts and listen out for him.

It may be that we need to find an Eli to be a soul friend or a spiritual director to guide us and to give us advice about this, because listening, proper listening, isn't always very easy - but God can find a way to do a lot with a very little. This means that sometimes we just have to shut up, pay attention and be silent so that God can call us in the silence – whatever time of day or night it happens to be. 'Speak Lord, for your servant is listening'.

Then in our gospel reading we find Jesus calling Philip. He says to him 'Follow me,' and the first thing Philip does is to get hold of Nathanael and tell him about Jesus. Nathanael is very dubious about the whole business, especially when he hears that Jesus comes from Nazareth. We may wonder - what's the problem with Nazareth? Some say that Nathanael's comment refers to Nazareth's obscurity - it certainly wasn't a big, important town. Perhaps there's a bit of local rivalry here because later in John's gospel we are told that Nathanael comes from the village of Cana which is just along the road from Nazareth. Maybe Nathanael the village boy is being rather rude about the inhabitants of the next village. Maybe Nathanael has difficulty in imagining that a local carpenter in the next village can be anything special or that God can work in someone so very ordinary.

Philip doesn't waste time or words arguing with Nathanael, he simply says, 'Come and see.' So Nathanael goes along with it, he accompanies Philip to where Jesus is and his dismissive first impressions are swept away. We might like to remember that we may be part of the formation of someone else's calling, just as Philip told Nathanael to 'Come and see' and Eli guides Samuel in how to respond. Do we need to say, 'Come and see' to someone we know and so introduce them to Christ!

So what have our two readings to say to us? When we were baptized, Jesus said to each one of us, 'Follow me.' Each one of us has a particular calling to follow Christ in our own particular way. It may be that our own calling to follow Christ is something that we feel strongly or perhaps we have only gradually come to see. Even if we are not aware of any particular form of calling, the very fact that we turn up in church or perhaps follow a service online demonstrates that we are trying to follow Christ's call.

When Nathanael co-operated with Philip in going along to see Jesus perhaps he thought that it would be a bit of laugh to see this carpenter turned wandering preacher in action. It may be that he had no idea that meeting Jesus would turn his life upside down. We don't know where following Jesus will lead us, yet still Jesus calls to us, 'Follow me'. We simply have to try to be obedient to his call, to try to pay attention so we can say, 'Speak Lord for your servant is listening' and follow him throughout our lives, no matter how easy or difficult this may be.
